October 2024 Pastor's Pen

"Daily we should take account and ask: What have I done today to alleviate the anguish, to mitigate the evil, to prevent humiliation? Our concern must be expressed not symbolically, but literally; not only publicly, but also privately; not only occasionally, but regularly. What we need is the involvement of every one of us as individuals." ~ Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel ******

Recently I read, "There is a poverty happening around us. Not just poverty of money, although that is certainly a reality. But there is a poverty of food, family, safety, and most of all, a poverty of hope." What do you think? Is this statement true? Is there some credibility to it? I'll admit I think there is a lot of truth in this statement, and a lot of credibility. And if such is true, what then is a faithful response to this "poverty of hope"? How to do we respond to this kind of poverty that can make a meaningful and lasting impact?

For starters, I think, we begin by doing as Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel implores us. We ask ourselves questions like... What have we done to alleviate the anguish that leads to a poverty of hope? What have we done to mitigate the evil that looms large around us, to prevent humiliation so many risks having thrust upon them that leads to a poverty of hope?

Yes, here I go again, asking big questions so we are forced to take an introspective look at ourselves. And while I believe taking an introspective look at ourselves is always good, where I am going with this primarily is this... First Christian Church of Stow is literally, publicly, privately, and regularly involved in alleviating anguish, mitigating evil, preventing humiliation, and working to help others find new and renewed hope! We are a church that strives to meet, greet, and welcome all people, wherever they are in their spiritual walk. We are a church of grace, where we understand no one is perfect, but through the perfect love of Jesus Christ we can always draw closer and closer to the Divine. We are a church driven by what God is calling us to do-feeding the hungry, clothing the naked,

raising up others in faithfulness, and being a living presence of hope, peace, joy, and love in our community. We are a church that offers safe and affirming space for deep faith exploration, wrestling, and discovery, and where no question is off-limits. We are a church that gathers together, in person and across the miles, to give and sing our praise and worship to God our Creator and Christ Jesus our Savior, and then gathers around our Lord's table where all are welcome to come and receive the bread of life and the cup of salvation. And I have no doubt all of this is having a meaningful and lasting impact.

We are this church, and yet, we are still so much more. And I am writing this to remind us that this is who we are and that we are undoubtedly involved in the kind of work Rabbi Heschel implores all to do, and we are undoubtedly responding to the call God has given to us as a church. It is good and faithful work, and we should be proud of what we are doing here at First Christian Church of Stow, and for what we are doing beyond the walls of our church building.

Yes, it is good and right to do the introspective work and ask ourselves hard questions about how we are living out our faith and our call. And it is just as good and right to look deeply at all we are doing, and all we have done, see the meaningful and lasting impact our work has had, and then *celebrate* that work because we have faithfully partnered with God and literally got involved within God's work!

God is using us, First Christian Church of Stow, to help those who are afflicted with a poverty of hope to see and know that through God's good work, there is an abundance of hope to be discovered and experienced, there is an abundance of joy to be embraced, and there is an abundance of love for all. And because of it all, I am honored and proud to be your pastor. Thank you for your faithfulness and your willingness to be this kind of church—a church that has a meaningful, lasting, faithful, and loving impact and brings to all an abundance of hope.

October is the month in which we as a congregation begin to think, look, and pray about all God is calling us to be and do in the coming year, and how we as followers of Christ can respond faithfully to God's call. And once again we will be led through our "Devoted to Generosity" consecration campaign that will include our narrative budget that will allow us to hear about the impact our annual giving has not just within our church, but beyond our walls as well. This, and much more, is intended to encourage us to continue to do the good and faithful ministry God has called us to do, and to continue to be a church devoted to generosity by being the difference makers God calls us to be.

On Sunday, October 27th, during one combined time of worship at 10:30 a.m., we will conclude our 2025 Devoted to Generosity consecration campaign through the making of our estimated pledge of giving for next year. As living expressions of God's generosity may our pledge to God be in response to all God has given us. Together we are witnesses to the abundant life we know in Jesus Christ. <u>Loaves & Fishes + Pantry</u> <u>September Recap</u>

40 Families came through Loaves & Fishes + Pantry on Sunday September 15. These families represented 101 different people. 42 of these people were adults. That means that 59 of them were either seniors or children, our most vulnerable citizens. Everybody got a delicious spaghetti dinner with all the fixings.

Our pantry give-a-way included hot and cold cereal, regular and chocolate milk, veggies, bread, Entenmann's treats, stew, canned fruit, mac & cheese, apples, and other goodies.

We always give away a bag containing a roll of paper towels and four rolls of toilet paper. Everybody loves this bag. Remember, paper products are not eligible for food stamps so this is a big help for families strapped for cash.

Our next Loaves & Fishes + Pantry is scheduled for Sunday, October 20.

The Outreach team is preparing for our biggest outreach project of the year: Ingathering.

Your help wanted and needed!

Even though it is not yet Halloween, the outreach team is hard at work preparing for Christmas Ingathering. Ingathering is a huge and vital ministry for our church and community. Last year we served 44 families with children (food, coats and gifts) and 10 additional families with food assistance. It is a huge cooperative effort between businesses and organizations in the community, the Stow Munroe Falls City Schools and the generous and giving folks in this congregation. If you want to shop, wrap, make a donation, bake cookies, make phone calls, assist with excel program forms or want more information about the program, please see Ann Halpin or call 330-524-2228.

You can also help us prepare for this ministry by:

- buying items that may be on sale now for the food boxes (please check expiration dates).
 Possible items can include cereal, pasta, canned tomato products, tuna, juice, canned meat, mac and cheese, jelly, peanut butter, and soup. I try to buy a little bit of something every couple of weeks when things are on sale, especially now when grocery prices are high.
- 2) Discuss with family members if you might, as a group, sponsor a family for Ingathering.
- Discuss with your employer if they might like to make a donation or sponsor a family for Ingathering.
- 4) Consider donating new or used/ in good condition, household items. Families are often grateful for that lamp you no longer need, children's toys that your children have outgrown, holiday decorations, photo frames, pet supplies, folding chairs, unused candles, and women's purses to name a few. Tools, command strips, cleaners and cleaning supplies, laundry soap and plastic storage bins are also much appreciated.

2024 Chalice Grant Recipient Selected

In December 2017 the Congregation approved a Budget that included a special Chalice Grant of \$10,000 to be presented to a local non-profit organization in 2018. In order to have the Grant available we needed to exceed our budgeted income by 3% in any given year. Applicants for the Grant need to show an immediate need and show how many people in the community will benefit from it. In 2018 we presented the first Chalice Grant to Family Promise of Summit County. In 2019 the Congregation exceeded our budgeted income by the required amount once again triggering the Chalice Grant for 2020. We all know what happened in 2020 and we never completed the process of selecting a Chalice Grant recipient. This year the Stewardship Team decided it was time to present that Chalice Grant for 2024. On Wednesday September 25th The Chalice Grant Committee met to review the applications for the 2024 Grant. Members included Ann Halpin, Rae Howard, Jim Hindel, Rev. Rumburg, Sue Naylor, and Al Naylor. After reviewing the applications and listening to input from all members of the team, we decided to present the \$11,000.00 Grant to the Battered Women's Shelter aka Hope and Healing Survivor Resource Center, and on Sunday October 27th representatives from the organization will be present during the service to share information about the work they do in our community and to receive the Chalice Grant.

- Inspections by Stow Building Dept (and maybe Fire Dept)
- Painting it all
- Window treatments
- Install the pews
- Move the piano & chairs out of the chancel area, then put them back once all is ready
